50-yr Partner urges Union involvement

For 50 years, Gene Kaiser has been a UFCW

Local 655 partner. One of the longest partners in UFCWLocal655's history, Genesavsheowesmuchof his standard-of-living and his ability to raise a family on the salary and benefits negotiated by his Union.

He has three children, and put them all through college, something that he says would have been "impossible" with a non-Union job.

On May 23 he celebrated his 80th birthday. While some folks would have retired long ago, Gene still works between 24 and 32 hours per week, a testament to his work ethic and commitment to supporting the Union that supports him on the job.

"The members are the Union," Kaiser said. "We have fantastic leadership right now, but they don't get it done all on their own. It's the members coming together that make things happen. They are the Union, and I think a lot of younger people don't understand that. I tell them to get involved, take action, get involved with the Union even a little bit, and you can make a difference."

Schnucks, has been a Shop Steward for 46 vears, and a member of the UFCW Local 655 Executive Board for 33 years - the longest serving Board member in Local 655 history.

He's been to the State Capitol in Jefferson City many times for the annual legislative lobby day. He's served as a delegate at the UFCW International Convention, and sat on the first Volunteer Organizing Committee ever created by Local 655.

He's served on several bargaining committees when UFCW Local 655 has negotiated new contracts with employers. In 1978, Gene played an active role in the fight to beat Right-to-Work legislation here in Missouri, a fight that may soon return to the Show-Me State.

Through all these actions, Gene has been able to directly impact how his Union operates, and therefore, help improve his own life. He's cultivated a reputation as a knowledgeable Union partner, and is often the go-to man for many rank-and-file partners who have questions or concerns on the job.

"They even call me from other stores," Kaiser said. "I do everything I can to help because I'm concerned. I've always been concerned for my co-workers in our Union. I want it to work for other people the way its worked for me.

Above all else, Gene urges more involvement from Local 655 partners.

"An hour or two a week, that's all it takes," Kaiser said. "It's not just a job, it's a Union Family fighting for better things. Stand up, and get involved."
